Farewell to our Head Clover

On July 31st, Dr. Joe Kurth retires as Assistant Director of Cooperative Extension for 4-H Youth Development Programs, Kentucky 4-H will say good-bye to its Head Clover.

Dr. Kurth grew up on a farm near Wacker, IL, population 200. A member of the Tip Top Troopers 4-H Club for 10 years, a club that still exists today, Joe served as President of the County 4-H Federation and participated in several 4-H activities at County and state levels.

The best thing that happened during High School was that he met the smartest and prettiest girl in the school, Marianne Hall, with whom he has enjoyed 43 wonderful years of marriage. The Kurth's

have two children. Lisa lives in Boone, IA and Russell lives in Seattle, WA. Today, they enjoy parenting their grandson Jesse, a Junior at Henry Clay High School, who is an All-State trumpet player and 4-H Camp Counselor in Fayette County.

Joe earned a B.A. in history from Beloit College, a M.Ed. and Ph.D in Educational Curriculum and Instruction from the University of Missouri in Columbia. Before joining Extension, he taught Social Studies at Hickman High in Columbia, MO.

He began his 4-H career in Missouri as a 4-H Agent in Boone and Howard counties, and then became State 4-H Curriculum

Specialist at UMC. During that time, he served as the creator and coordinator of the National 4-H Curriculum Network. In 1986 he moved to Moscow, ID to become the Idaho State 4-H Director, beginning a 24 year career serving as State 4-H Director in four states, second in Washington, then Iowa and now in Kentucky.

During his eight years of leadership in Kentucky, Joe's major accomplishments include developing the Kentucky 4-H Core Curriculum, the Capital

Donor Spotlight

Bill Corum

In this issue we recognize J. William (Bill) Corum one of three recipients of the 2010 Friend of Kentucky 4-H Award. We will spotlight the other recipients in the July issue.

Bill Corum has been volunteering for 4-H for more than three decades, beginning in Meade County his home. After graduating from Campbellsville College, Bill began his professional career as Vice President of Member Services in 1970 with the Meade County Rural Electric Cooperative. He was quickly recognized for his strong leadership and love for the 4-H program. His passion of helping Kentucky's youth put him in demand to lead and promote Kentucky 4-H.

During his career Bill served in many roles with 4-H, all the while keeping the focus on Making the Best Better for Kentucky's youth. His leadership roles include, President of the Meade

County 4-H Council, President of the Kentucky 4-H Leaders Council, and President of Friends of Kentucky 4-H, now the Kentucky 4-H Foundation. During his time on the Friends' Board he was instrumental in raising the funds for the construction of the Kentucky Leadership Center at the Lake Cumberland 4-H Center in Jabez. Bill also served as an advisor to the State 4-H Teen Council.

Retiring in 2000, as Vice President of Operations and Engineering, after 30 years with the Meade County Rural Electric Cooperative, Bill began another phase of his career. In January 2002 he became Vice President of Operations for the Kentucky Association of Electric Cooperatives, Inc. Once again Bill's leadership skills were quickly recognized and in January of this year he became the President & CEO of the Kentucky Association of Electric Cooperatives, Inc. and United Utility Supply Cooperative, Inc.

In addition to 4-H and his professional career, Bill has led a number of local, regional and statewide civic and governmental groups. Bill and his wife Pamela reside in Brandenburg. The Corums have two grown children and three grandchildren.

With the support of the Kentucky 4-H Foundation's grant of \$50,000 and an additional \$75,000 award from the National Toyota Foundation 4-H2O Water Quality Grant, Kentucky 4-H is leading the charge to reach 1 million new youth in 4-H SET programs by 2013.

Today in rural, urban and suburban communities in Kentucky, 4-H offers youth camps and clubs in aerospace and flight simulation; robotics; geospatial treasure hunting and 3-D modeling (GPS/GIS); environmental water education; biotechnology and forensic science inquiry based classes.

leaders for the 21st Century. In the 2009 reporting year, extension counties reported 20,633 youth contacts in Science, Engineering & Technology which is a 20% increase in youth participation since Kentucky 4-H SET began in the Fall of 2006. 4-H youth and volunteers are partnering with community organizations to make the Best Better!
