Teen Conference: A Tradition Worth Remembering and Keeping

No matter what you knew it by, Junior Week, 4-H Week, Senior Conference or Teen Conference, there is a long tradition in Kentucky 4-H that you may remember. This annual event, now held the second week of June on the University of Kentucky campus has played host to thousands of 4-Hers for over 86 years.

That's correct, the Kentucky 4-H Teen Conference held June 14 – 17, 2010 was the 86th annual event known by one of four names. It all started in 1921 with the first "Junior Week" on the University of Kentucky campus with 130 attending. Over the next 18 years the attendance grew to 744 participants from 111 counties in 1939. During World

War II, Junior Week was canceled from 1942 through 1946, resuming in 1947 with the name "4-H Week". Most state-level contests were held during the week – fashion revue, state demonstrations, speech and judging contests to name a few.

In 1975, the Kentucky 4-H Teen Council started with its main role being to plan and carryout 4-H Week. Today that tradition continues while the Teen Council also has taken on many other roles and responsibilities such as the 4-H Summit, held at the Lake Cumberland 4-H Educational Center near Jabez.

In 1988, 4-H Week became 4-H Senior Conference, and then in 2003 its name was changed to its present

title of Kentucky 4-H Teen Conference. Many 4-Hers have come and gone in those 86 years, but the purpose remains the same. 4-Hers from across Kentucky come to Lexington to experience living on campus, learning and having fun. It's deemed as one of the best youth development experiences Kentucky 4-H has to offer.

A quick search of today's social media sites such as Facebook can turn-up comments about the week such as: "No

Back then, 4-H did not need as much private support. That's not the case today.

It's the power of numbers that will help make us successful in growing the financial support for Kentucky 4-H. The numbers I speak of are the hundreds of thousands of 4-H Alumni. Yes, we will continue to pursue large donations from business and organizations. But the base of support must and should come from those of us who have benefited so greatly from our 4-H experience.

The 4-H Foundation has launched a new campaign called "Looking to the Future: New Decade, New

Donor Spotlight

Pat & Lynwood Schrader

Pat and Lynwood Schrader have been strong supporters of Kentucky 4-H and the UK College of Agriculture for more than 50 years.

Together they have made a difference in the lives of many young people, whether it was as a mentor, fund raising for Kentucky 4-H or providing leadership in so many ways. Lynwood sums up these efforts by saying, "You do it for young people."

Lynwood graduated from UK in 1952 and since then has given both his time and money to support the College of Agriculture, 4-H, and other related organizations. In the 1960's, he helped lead the effort to persuade the legislature to fund the College's Ag North building. Before that, as a student at UK, he served as the first President of the Kentucky Chapter of FarmHouse in 1951. Today he continues to provide leadership to FarmHouse Fraternity as Campaign Co-chair of the Chapter's "Building for the Future: The Campaign for Kentucky FarmHouse," a fund-raising campaign to build a new fraternity house on UK's campus.

Pat Schrader completed two degrees (B.A., '71; M.A., '79) from UK while raising three sons. The Schrader's are clearly a UK family, with sons John, Joel and Jamie all graduated from UK. From 1981 to 1989, Pat was Extension information specialist for 4-H publications. Her work included writing programs and editing the Ambassador.

During Lynwood's career at Kentucky Utilities Company he rose through the company to retire as senior vice president of the company. Lynwood was instrumental in the creation of Friends of Kentucky 4-H, now the Kentucky 4-H Foundation. He was one of three individuals that incorporated the non-profit, serving on its Board of Directors for more than two decades and it's President from 1978 through 1980 and from 1985 through 1989. He was a driving force behind the construction of the Kentucky Leadership Center which is now known as the Lake Cumberland 4-H Educational Center in Jabez. He delivered the keynote speech at the center's dedication in 1987.

In 1983, Lynwood received the Thomas Poe Cooper Award, which is given annually by the Kentucky chapter of Gamma Sigma Delta, the agricultural honor society, for distinguished farm leadership. The Schrader's are UK Fellows and members of the Scovell Society.

After Pat retired from Extension in 1989, she was able to devote more time to researching and writing the first 70 years of the Kentucky 4-H history. She gave her manuscript to Dr. Joe Kurth in 2007, just prior to the celebration of the 100th anniversary of Kentucky 4-H in 2009. It is available to the public at Kentucky4-H.org under "Our History."

Kentucky 4-H is pleased to honor Pat and Lynwood Schrader with the 2010 Friend of Kentucky 4-H Award for helping to Make the Best Better for Kentucky 4-H.

Board Spotlight

William Wilson

Bill Wilson grew up in Lexington, Kentucky, but this city boy spent his summers in Madison County in the small town of Kirksville helping his uncle on the farm.

“Even though I helped my uncle on the farm my part in 4-H as a youth though had nothing to do with cows, sows, and plows,” Wilson explained. “An extension agent that lived down the street from me explained that 4-H was about more than just the farming elements, so I became involved with other projects like electricity.”

In fact, Wilson is quick to tell the story of how 4-H saved his life.

“I once cut the wires on a pair of my father’s electric clippers, but I was able to rewire the clippers and my father never knew,” laughed Wilson. “I’ve often said if it hadn’t been for what I learned in 4-H my father would have killed me on site that day.”

After receiving his BA

from KSU in History and Political Science and his MA from UK in Psychology and Counseling Wilson began teaching. While teaching he had the opportunity to work at KET on a history series. The staff at KET saw potential in this young teacher and applied for and received a grant from the Corporation of Public Broadcasting to bring Wilson on staff for a year and train him in all the elements of public television.

Wilson continued to work at KET for several years after his grant ended and then was given the opportunity to work on a special project with the Cambridge Publishing Company. After eight years of traveling and working on the special Cambridge project, Wilson returned to KET where he became Deputy Executive Director of Marketing and then the Deputy Executive Director for Education and Outreach.

After enjoying a year of retirement, Wilson was asked by KSU President

Dr. Mary Sias to come back to his alma mater to serve in the Division of External Relations where he works today.

“I only knew a little about 4-H when I began serving on this board,” said Wilson talking about his years of service on the 4-H Foundation Board. “One of the things that was most impressive beyond the diversity of projects in Kentucky is that 4-H has a high emphasis on getting young people involved with leadership positions and I think that is a neat thing to do.”

Wilson believes that 4-H offers amazing educational opportunities for Kentucky’s young people.

“I am honored to serve on this board to help make 4-H programs available to the youth across Kentucky.”
