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4-H: A CAPITOL EXPERIENCE CELEBRATES 12 YEAR ANNIVERSARY

The 4-H: A Capitol Experience was the result of a need to initiate an awareness program for 4-H youth, volunteers, and professionals on State government operations. The program began as an opportunity for youth to see our State Government in action during the legislative session and to assure that the Legislators are aware of the importance of Kentucky's 4-H program, the University of KY Cooperative Extension Service and the College of Agriculture. The 4-H: A Capitol Experience serves as a statewide government and citizenship educational program.

In 2017, we celebrated the twelfth anniversary of the 4-H: A Capitol Experience Program, we have made great strides in reaching our goals of providing a statewide 4-H government and citizenship program that explores careers in public policy, impacts our local communities

while providing a networking opportunity for our 4-H members, volunteers, supporters and professionals to interact with our public officials while watching our Government in action and be involved in policy decisions. Over 14,000 members, volunteers, parents and Extension professionals representing 86 counties have interacted with legislators on an individual and group basis. Each year this event is made possible by two sponsors including Kentucky's Touchstone Energy Cooperatives and the Kentucky Association of Extension 4-H Agents (KAE4-HA).

"I am glad that you are here today because I owe all of my leadership and life skills to the 4-H program. I am a 10 year 4-H member, and it was the only organization that I was involved in while growing up " was the opening sentences of Kentucky Governor Matt Bevin's address to the 4-H members. leaders and Extension staff at the 2016 4-H A Capitol Experience program. He continued to explain that one of the highlights of his 4-H career was his involvement in leadership and citizenship programs and prepared him to achieve his current career goals.

One of the Legislators commented that:

"I am a Representative today because of my involvement in the 4-H program! The speeches, judging and project work have helped me everyday in making those critical decisions."

4-H is in the business of helping shape the leaders of tomorrow. Many of the current congressional leaders are a testimony to this as they are 4-H alumni. Programs offered through 4-H work to strengthen leadership skills in youth, and 4-H: A Capitol Experience is no exception. By participating in the program, youth can learn valuable leadership skills and receive insight into the state government through conversing with government officials, viewing a congressional session and participating in educational programs to locations such as the Governor's Mansion, Capitol and Old Capitol. Evaluation results of the program have shown that 78% of the youth had their first trip to the State Capitol while 92% learned the names of their Legislators and Government Officials.

Youth learn about and may even participate in the process of political change. Many times, youth will ask their local legislatures questions and discuss issues that involve youth, education and local communities. Not only is this a great opportunity for youth, but it is a testimony to state legislatures of the effectiveness of 4-H.

One of the Senators commented that "This is one of my favorite days as a Senator. I get to interact with our youth and find out what is on your minds. I think this is a wonderful program to introduce so many young people to how our government works. I wish I had had this opportunity because my first visit to Frankfort and the Capitol was the day I was sworn in as a legislator. You are lucky to be involved in the 4-H program as what you learn will help you throughout your life!"

According to a KY legislator, "There are two ways to learn about government. The first is to read textbooks about what others have done. The second way is to learn to take that knowledge and apply it in an actual government setting. The 4-H: A Capitol Experience provides KY 4-H members with a great opportunity to experience our government at work."

Having a strong understanding of the state government can help youth grow and mature to be informed, active members of their community. A validation to the program is witnessing our 4-H members and alumni assume various leadership and citizenship roles in our communities, state and at the national level.

Youth and adults had the opportunity to observe our government in action, addressing and voting on public policy issues. The group experienced a wonderful opportunity for networking with 4-H youth from across the commonwealth. Youth were given the opportunity to explore career opportunities in government and learn about the responsibility of citizen involvement in the overall influence in policy decisions. Due to the success of the program, 4-H: A Capitol Experience will be part of the statewide programming next year!

As the Kentucky 4-H state officers' term winds to an end, we are remaining busy reaching out to counties and programs to have a lasting impact on Kentucky 4-H. Have you ever wondered just how leaders are made through the 4-H program? After observing youth in Kentucky 4-H, there is no doubt they are gaining the skills they need to become the next generation of leaders. Weeks ago, the state 4-H officers experienced

Brent Hutchinson is Executive Director of Hindman Settlement School in Knott County. Hindman Settlement School, founded in 1902, was the first and most successful rural settlement in the United States, modeled after urban centers such as Toynbee Hall in London, England and Hull House in Chicago. The School seeks to provide education and service opportunities to people of the mountains while keeping them mindful of their heritage. Notably, Hindman Settlement School forged a strategic partnership over four decades ago to make way for Knott County's first 4-H agent. The Settlement taught extension education to their students throughout the early-middle twentieth century.

Hutchinson comes to the board as a former 4-Her from Lawrence County and credits 4-H with his lifelong passion for leadership and learning. Brent earned the Ph.D. in Leadership Studies from Dallas Baptist University, with a special focus on servant, public, and cultural leadership. He also holds degrees from Morehead State University and the University of Kentucky College of Human Environmental Science (now the College of Agriculture, Food, and Environment).

Brent's earliest 4-H experience was attending 4-H Camp at the Diederich 4-H Center in Rush and enjoyed speech and demonstration competitions; and horticulture, forestry, and poultry judging, which earned him a spot on Kentucky's ranked poultry and avian bowl teams two consecutive years. Brent attended the inaugural Issues Conference in 1989 and attended Senior Conference (now Teen Conference) every year he was eligible, enjoying this the most!

As an older teen and, eventually, collegiate member, Brent worked as a 4-H camp staffer at Diederich for one summer; represented Kentucky at the National 4-H Conference in Silver Springs, Maryland; served as a threeyear member of the State Teen Council, winning the Conrad Feltner Leadership Award; and, ultimately, was elected Vice President of Kentucky 4-H, serving from 1993-94.
