The Kentucky 4-H Achievement program is a cumulative compilation of 4-H'ers entire 4-H experience and work. 4-H'ers apply and compete for four progressively higher Achievement levels (Bronze, Silver, Gold, and Emerald). Each level provides youth with recognition and prizes including scholarships to attend State Teen Conference, National Congress, and National Conference.

The highest honor in Kentucky 4-H's Achievement Program, the Emerald Award, is presented annually to four 4-H'ers chosen following a rigorous application and interview process. In addition to their interview, participants are judged on their resume, cover letter, a video presentation, which highlight their accomplishments across five categories: Leadership, Citizenship, Communications/Marketing, Community Service, and Participation.



MEET THE NEW HEAD CLOVER: DR. RACHEL GUIDUGLI



Rachel Guidugli is not new to Kentucky 4-H, 25 years ago she started her 4-H journey at the age of 9 as a summer camper with Madison County 4-H. As Rachel grew up through the 4-H program her 4-H Agent connected her with various experiences and opportunities to stretch her leadership skills. Rachel served as a leader in her county and district, which led her to serving on the State Teen Council.

After high school Rachel attended the University of Louisville where she majored in Communication. Immediately after graduation she worked two

vears as a consultant for Chi Omega Fraternity where she continued to learn and grow on a national scale. After her two year appointment Rachel set roots back in Kentucky and began graduate school at Eastern Kentucky University, eventually achieving her Masters and Doctorate degrees. When Rachel returned to Kentucky she reconnected with 4-H as an adult volunteer. Through volunteering Rachel realized her passion was youth development work within Kentucky communities. Volunteering led Rachel to serving as the Clark County 4-H Youth Development Agent where the team she was a part of expanded the communication, robotics, shooting sports, expressive arts, school enrichment, and camping programs.

After almost four years in Clark County, Rachel moved into the 4-H Leadership and International Programs Specialist role where she spearheaded enhancements to the State Teen Council. the State Officer program, and Teen Conference. Through her leadership in the international program Kentucky grew to record numbers in both inbound

and outbound youth exchanges and produced global education curriculum now used nationwide.

Rachel is devoted to the mission and vision of the Cooperative Extension Service as she is a product of how transformational a 4-H experience is. Kentucky 4-H has the ability to change the trajectory of the lives of young people across the Commonwealth through our high quality positive youth development programs. In Kentucky 4-H young people identify their spark, are connected to a caring adult, find a place to belong among a group of peers, and are encouraged to share their voice. Rachel believes all young people have the potential to thrive, but not all have the opportunity. Kentucky 4-H can be that opportunity.

Rachel looks forward to building relationships across the Commonwealth as we move our programs forward. She also looks forward to advocating for the Kentucky 4-H Foundation as we, together, fund and provide opportunities for Kentucky youth.


