AG TAG CHECK PRESENTATION



Kentucky farmers donated \$606,223.11 to the Ag Tag Program for 2022, bringing the total of donations to more than \$4.3 million since 2016. The voluntary donations are divided equally among Kentucky 4-H, Kentucky FFA, and the Kentucky Department of Agriculture (KDA). This year, each group will receive \$202,074.37.

"Farmer-supported Ag Tag dollars

are instrumental in supporting 4-H programs in all 120 counties. Giving allows local 4-H programs to grow youth as leaders, build their communication skills, and develop them into active, engaged members of their community," said Melissa Miller, Executive Director of the Kentucky 4-H Foundation. Welcome to the New Program Year!

As we welcome a new program year and celebrate the transformational opportunities we provide young people and their communities, I'd like to take time to celebrate the successes of Kentucky 4-H in the last year. This past program year Kentucky 4-H reached 138,602 youth and engaged 13,827 youth and adult volunteers. Over the summer the Kentucky 4-H Camping Program hosted 12,402 individuals at our four camping facilities. 4-H agents and volunteers worked tirelessly building high quality positive youth

development programming. To highlight a few successes in club and project work: 24,922 youth gained life skills through 4-H projects, 14,322 youth gained leadership skills through 4-H clubs, and 4,000 youth gained public speaking skills through 4-H communication projects.

As we look to the new year, I have a goal of Kentucky 4-H reaching 200,000 youth, back to pre-pandemic enrollment numbers. To ensure we are meeting the needs of Kentucky 4-H agents, youth, and volunteers the Kentucky 4-H State Office will be undergoing a program and operations review. In addition, we are partnering with the Kentucky 4-H Foundation to travel the state to hear from our participants through 4-H Community Conversations. As our youth, families, and communities rapidly change, we must be ready to adapt our programming to meet their needs, these two initiatives will allow us to learn and grow programming. We are eager to continue working hard to provide opportunity for all young people to thrive in Kentucky 4-H.
