Beyond Ready



Beyond Ready Signing Day

An exciting milestone for Kentucky 4-H, as 61 students took part in the inaugural Kentucky 4-H Beyond Ready Signing Day, a collaborative initiative between Wayne County 4-H and Jobs for America's Graduates (JAG). This event celebrated the accomplishments and future plans of high school seniors as they prepare to step confidently into college, careers, the trades, and military service.

The impact of the program was evident in survey feedback from participants. A remarkable 96% of unemployed students reported feeling equipped with the skills they need to succeed. Among students who are currently employed, every single one shared that the Mock Interview program was an invaluable experience. Impressively, 28% of those working students have already received promotions or raises since their participation. Overall, 98% of all participants said they now feel more confident applying for jobs—a clear sign that the program is preparing students for real-world success.

As these seniors look ahead, many are headed to college, with plans to attend the University of Kentucky, University of the Cumberlands, Eastern Kentucky University, and Somerset Community College. Others are entering the

workforce directly, combining employment with further education, or even launching their own businesses. A number of students are also pursuing skilled trades, such as HVAC and electrical training through Somerset Community College. Several students have chosen to serve their country by joining the military, with commitments to the Navy, basic training programs, and the National Guard.

The Kentucky 4-H Beyond Ready Signing Day was more than just a celebration —it was a powerful reminder of the potential within every student when given the right tools, support, and encouragement. Congratulations to all the seniors on their achievements and their bright futures ahead. Your 4-H community is proud of you, and you are truly beyond ready.

Cassidy May turned her passion for creating and the joy flowers bring into her dream job: a wedding and event florist. She founded The Wild Rose in 2022 and expanded her team in 2023. They are committed to providing quality florals for all types of celebrations.

She grew up in Jessamine County, and attributes most of her life skills to her time spent with 4-H, and Cathy Weaver in particular. Her early days of 4-H participation began with speech and demonstration competitions, the first of many activities that pulled her from her comfort zone. She attended 4-H camp, continuing to return as an adult volunteer, and was active in the Jessamine County 4-H Teen Council. She went on to partake in the District 4-H Teen Council, helping to plan and execute the 2016 retreat, and was a member of the Kentucky 4-H Performing Arts Troupe. Starting her 4-H career as a shy middle schooler who tried her best to blend in, she ended it as a confident 18-year-old who was ready to take on the world.

As leader of The Wild Rose, she heads up an average of 45 events per year, empowers her team to step up when needed, and prioritizes using Kentucky-grown flowers in her designs when possible. The designs you see from her today consist of 100% Kentucky-grown products from flower farms across the state, purchased from The Kentucky Flower Market.

4-H Teen Summit

Beyond the Summit

The 4-H Summit is a transformative experience for middle school youth, offering opportunities to grow, connect, and learn. This year, 115 youth, 33 Teen Leaders, and 43 adults came together for social activities, handson learning, and leadership development. This impactful event is made possible by the generous contributions of the Kentucky 4-H Foundation.



At the Summit, participants built social skills and new friendships, with 57% of attendees excited about meeting new people and 51% enjoying time with friends. These interactions help youth grow emotionally and academically, fostering a sense of belonging that supports healthy development.

Hands-on workshops were a major highlight, with 61% of attendees naming them their favorite part. Whether learning leadership skills (which 39% found most valuable) or practical topics like car maintenance, youth gained confidence and critical thinking skills that will serve them well in the future.

The Summit also emphasizes civic engagement. Participants took part in community service projects, like writing encouraging notes to assisted living residents, which helped them feel more connected to their communities.

The success of the Summit is evident from the positive feedback, with many participants eager to continue their 4-H involvement. On average, they were 3.7 times more likely to participate in other 4-H activities as a result of the Summit. This event not only boosts youth development but also inspires a lifelong commitment to leadership and service, preparing them for a bright future.



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Joseph Kurth, **Former Assistant Director of Cooperative Extension for 4-H Youth Development Programs**

Joe Kurth, 77, of Lexington, Kentucky, passed away unexpectedly at his home on March 20, 2025. He was born on April 8, 1947, in Savanna, Illinois, to Jay and Kathryn Kurth. Joe met Marianne Hall, the love of his life, during their freshman year of high school, and the two were married in 1966. They shared 55 years of marriage and had two children, Lisa and Russell.

Joe's journey with 4-H began early. He was a dedicated member of the Tip Top Troopers 4-H Club for 10 years. His mother, Kathryn, a 4-H project leader, made sure he completed his record books on time—a habit that reflected his lifelong commitment to follow-through and excellence. Joe earned a B.A. in History from Beloit College in 1969 and later completed his M.Ed. and Ph.D. in

Educational Curriculum and Instruction at the University of Missouri.

In Kentucky, Joe's vision and leadership left a lasting mark. One of his most significant achievements was helping to shape the Kentucky 4-H Foundation into a stronger, more sustainable entity. He led the effort to create the Executive Director position within the Foundation, a move that brought professional leadership to its fundraising and development efforts and ensured long-term support for youth programming across the state. His belief in the importance of private funding and organizational leadership helped transform the Foundation into a dynamic partner in Kentucky's 4-H mission.

During his tenure, Joe developed the Kentucky 4-H Core Curriculum, organizing youth programming around seven major content areas. He successfully advocated for a \$2 million legislative appropriation to enhance and support Kentucky's 4-H camping program, and under his leadership, all four state camping centers achieved American Camp Association (ACA) accreditation. He introduced critical volunteer training programs, including the Livestock and Horse Volunteer Certification systems and their re-certification components. He also reinvented major state-level events such as the 4-H Junior Communications Event, and launched new experiences like "4-H: A Capitol Experience" and the 4-H Summit, giving youth more meaningful ways to engage with civic life and develop leadership skills.

Joe Kurth retired from the University of Kentucky in August 2010, capping off an extraordinary career that spanned more than five decades and touched countless lives. His legacy is one of service, vision, and heart. He was a consensus-builder, a mentor, and a tireless advocate for youth and the adults who support them. His influence extended nationally through his leadership on the National 4-H Name and Emblem Committee and the Board of Directors for the National 4-H Council. In recognition of his contributions, he received the Kentucky 4-H Distinguished Leadership Award in 2012 and was inducted into the National 4-H Hall of Fame in 2015.



From Seed to Success

The Carroll County 4-H Garden Club blossomed in a big way this past year with help from a Kentucky 4-H Foundation Ag Mini-Grant, which funded a hands-on horticulture project that engaged youth in growing and selling chrysanthemums.

With their "Fall Mum Market" project, members dove into agriculture, business, and marketing-learning to grow mums from seedlings and managing every part of the small enterprise. "It was really cool to go plant the seedlings and then see something so colorful grow from it," said 11-year-old Addison Rose. "The whole process from seedling, to beautiful flower and on to a new happy owner was very

Wesley Smith, age 9, added, "I liked watching the mums grow over the summer."

From studying soil conditions and pest control to organizing inventory and customer service at local events, the youth led the way. When a delayed soil delivery threatened their schedule, they quickly sourced an alternative gaining early insight into supply chain issues.

Social media also played a key role. With adult guidance, members created promotional content and shared weekly updates, helping them sell out their entire crop. "This project opened a door for kids who might not have thought about agriculture as a career or even a hobby," said Garden Club Leader Elizabeth Mefford. "It was more than growing mums-it was about growing minds."

Working with the City of Carrollton, the club provided mums for fall decorations downtown, enhancing community pride. "Growing mums through the 4-H Garden Club was a great experience in agriculture and community partnership," said Garden Club President Brenna Mefford.

Because of the Kentucky 4-H Foundation Ag Mini-Grant, the youth not only grew flowers-they grew confidence, skills, and a sense of possibility. With proceeds from their sales and a new grant in hand, the club is already planning an even bigger project for next year.

Participants were captivated by the significance of thoughtful design and quality materials in the creation of luxurious home environments.

A career exploration trip wouldn't be complete without a fashion show, and the University of Kentucky Department

of Fashion Merchandising and Apparel from the Martin-Gatton College of Agriculture, Food, and Environment rose to the occasion splendidly. Attendees were treated to a showcase of Southern-inspired fashion trends modeled by current students at UK, highlighting the collaborative spirit of local businesses and emerging talent. During the Color Me Kentucky Fashion Show, the Kentucky 4-H Fashion Leadership Committee was recognized for its contributions to the fashion community.
